



Education Checklist – Guard/Reserve

- Fill Out VA Form 22-1990, “Application for VA Education Benefits” - Many service members may qualify for the New Post 9/11 GI Bill. This form is the only way to verify your benefit eligibility. In addition, by filling out the form now you will save time later when you are ready to start using your GI Bill. These benefits could be worth more than \$100,000 in education assistance money.

- Increase your GI Bill Benefit – If you are eligible for the Montgomery GI Bill, you may be able to increase your benefit by up to \$5,400 by making an additional \$600 (non-refundable) contribution. But you must do it before you separate from active duty. Download DD Form 2366-1, at <http://www.dtic.mil/whs/directives/infomgt/forms/eforms/dd2366-1.pdf>
- Get Your DD Form 2586 VMET Document - Your DD Form 2586, “Verification of Military Experience and Training” documents your skills and knowledge for potential employers or

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school officials. See your Transition Assistance Counselor or Education Office for assistance. Visit the Military Installations website <http://www.militaryinstallations.dod.mil/> to locate the office nearest you.

- Take an Academic Entrance Exam - If you are considering going back to school, you should take one or all of these exams. They are free to service members only while on active duty. Contact your local Education Service Office for assistance. Visit the Military Installations website at <http://www.militaryinstallations.dod.mil/> for assistance in finding the office nearest you.

- Get Your Official Military Education and Training Transcripts - Visit one of the following websites to request your official transcript:

 - Navy and Marine Corps: To get the Sailor/Marine American Council on Education Registry Transcript (SMART) go to https://www.navycollege.navy.mil/smart_info.cfm.
